10.4 Director Infrastructure & Planning Report – Prepared by James Magee**National Broadband Network (NBN)**

Council has received advice that installation of NBN equipment for Warracknabeal will commence 2015, with a view to having the facility online during the first half of 2016.

Works are underway at the Minyip, Murtoa and Rupanyup sites.

NBN facilities proposed for the townships north of Warracknabeal are subject to the Federal Fixed Wireless and Satellite Strategic Review.

Beulah Weir Gates

Council has been successful in obtaining \$100,000 from the State Government via the 'Putting Locals First' program. The project will involve construction of a concrete base, pillars and attachment of aluminium gates. Works commenced late April.

Optimising Management of Wimmera Weir Pools

The Wimmera Catchment Management Authority has obtained funding for the project. It will look at the water levels of weir pools, environmental flows and maximising benefits for the community and the environment. The project will take several months.

Beulah Hall Kitchen Upgrade and Beulah Multi-purpose Centre Upgrade Joint Project

- Adequate local funding for the hall kitchen has been donated
- The EOI was supported by RDV on 29 April 2014
- The final application was lodged on 7 May 2014

Boolite Hall Upgrade

- An initial meeting was held with the local Hall Committee in October regarding needs for the Hall
- The committee plans to arrange quotes for planned works sometime during 2014

Hopetoun RSL Building Upgrade and Patchwork Club Relocation

- This project has a high level of local support with Hopetoun Lionesses, Red Cross and Happy Helpers keen to use the upgraded building
- A wide range of local donations have been received
- A final funding application was submitted to RDV on 25 March 2014

Hopetoun Industrial Estate

- The approved estimated cost of the four Lot subdivision is \$194,000
- RDV funding of \$82,500 was approved in September 2013
- The remainder of funding is from Council
- The planning permit was issued in April 2014
- Purchase of the land by Council is almost complete
- Design to comply with VicRoads' conditions have been completed (will require widening of the highway)
- Design of road works are currently underway
- A contract for water and sewerage infrastructure has been awarded to S & C Macklin

Hopetoun Mallee Bush Retreat Stage 5

- Stage 5 is the construction of another accommodation unit
- RDV funding of \$60,000 was announced during October 2013
- The cultural heritage assessment has given approval for the project
- A planning permit for the development has been issued
- Information for the building permit is currently being prepared

Lubeck Recreation Reserve Shelter

- Shire staff met with the local committee to discuss the project in 2013
- The local committee is scoping and costing the project

Minyip Bushland Reserve Resurfacing Project

- DOT funding of \$4,000, Rupanyup Community Bank funding of \$1,000 and RDV funding of \$7,800 have been approved
- Graveling of the walking track has been completed
- Brochures are currently being printed
- The feature sign for the reserve has been installed

Murtoa Walking and Bicycle Tracks

- Council is assisting the Murtoa Progress Association to develop this project
- It is currently at the early planning stage

Patchewollock Walking Tracks

- The project involves upgrading some walking tracks and the car park
- The project has been discussed on site with the Patchewollock Progress Association and DOT
- The Patchewollock Progress Association has committed \$5,000 to the project dependant on DOT funding
- It is currently at the early planning stage

Patchewollock Railway Station Building Upgrade

- Shire staff have met with the local Progress Association and DOT to discuss and scope the project
- The project involves restoring the heritage listed Railway Station building to a reasonable standard
- The project needs to be costed and an application for funds made

Warracknabeal Town Hall Sustainability Plan

- RDV require the Hall Committee to complete a long term plan for upgrading the building supported by a business case before they will consider any grants for capital works
- RDV approved \$7,500 in funding for the \$10,000 project on 19 March 2014
- A consultant's brief for the plan has been prepared
- Proposals have been requested from two consultants

Warracknabeal Town Hall Upgrade

- The committee is scoping and costing the project and designing a new kitchen with a design consultant
- The first stage of the committee's priorities focuses on upgrading the kitchen and supper room

Warracknabeal Historical Society Business and Marketing Plan

- RDV require the Museum to complete a business and marketing plan before they will consider funding any capital works
- RDV approved \$7,500 in funding for the \$10,000 project on 19 March 2014
- A consultant's brief for the plan has been prepared
- Proposals have been requested from two consultants

Warracknabeal Wheatlands Museum Foyer Construction

- Assistance was given to the committee in the development of working drawings and specifications
- The committee is currently engaging a project manager and proceeding with the construction

Woomelang Cronomby Tanks Walking Track Development

- Walking tracks and the car park have been gravelled
- A planning permit for the toilet has been approved
- Information for the building permit is currently being prepared
- The outstanding works being the construction of the toilet have been ordered and should be completed by the end of May 2014
- Additional walking tracks and signs are planned subject to additional funding

Woomelang Hall Kitchen Upgrade

- Council staff have offered assistance to the local committee in developing this project
- The local committee are at an early planning stage

Yarriambiack Creek Footbridge in Warracknabeal

- The project estimate is \$295,000
- RDV funding of \$220,000 was approved in October 2013
- DOT funding of \$20,000 has been approved
- The Creek Committee is supplying cash and in-kind funding
- Council is providing in-kind project management and design support
- A planning permit for the works has been issued
- Four tenders for the works were received
- Council awarded the design and construction contract to Andrew Cairns Nominees Pty Ltd trading as Cable Bridge Constructions for \$250,500 plus GST on 12 February 2014
- A boardwalk to connect the suspension bridge to the east-side of the creek has been designed
- Detailed design of the works is currently proceeding
- The creek level is currently being lowered to allow the works to proceed
- In-kind earthworks by the committee and Council staff and plant to give pile driving equipment access to the site are planned for 11 May 2014
- Construction is likely to occur during May and June 2014

Kindergartens

Staff attended their Professional Development planning day and meeting to discuss new Department of Education & Early Childhood Development (DEECD) regulations and plan for the year. We have scheduled to have our pupil free days in June for Professional Development and are looking at holding the Annual Kindergarten Committee Dinner and Information Night around this time as well.

Completion of the Hopetoun Kindergarten is on track with landscaping works commencing on 5 May 2014.

Invites have gone out to VIP'S and guests for the Opening. The Kindergarten Committee will cater for the event as a fundraiser.

Youth

We have developed a Position Description and have advertised for a new Youth Engagement Officer. Applications close Friday, 30 May 2014.

Environmental Health / Local Laws – Prepared by Tim Rose and Greg Wilson

Food premise inspections continued through April, with no major breaches identified. A routine visit of one premises resulted in the seizure of food products and the service of two Food Act Orders to ensure future compliance; these premises will continue to be monitored.

Interest has been expressed in re-opening two existing hotels and one general food premise in our Shire. Council has assisted by undertaking a number of inspections for potential buyers/lessees. Council's Environmental Health Officer (EHO) was also required to utilise the services of the Victorian Interpreting and Translation Service for the first time to ensure advice was provided in an effective, fair and accurate manner. Following the translation of particular documents, feedback from this exercise was very positive from the individuals involved.

One single incident 'gastro notification' was received in late April. Further investigations have been scheduled with the affected individual to ascertain if there were any obvious or common potential pathogen sources.

Onsite wastewater has continued to be an area requiring significant staff resourcing to ensure appropriate assessment and issuing of permits. The construction of a new CFA Station in Speed is also near completion.

The second round of school based immunisations was undertaken in the month of April. Children were administered with the 2nd dose of Gardasil (HPV) and the first and only dose of Varilrix (Chickenpox). Sessions were conducted without incidents.

A formal agreement with Horsham Rural City Council will be trialled for the first time in coming weeks for EHO Relief coverage between municipalities. The agreement incorporating Horsham Rural City, Hindmarsh and West Wimmera Shire Councils requires that EHO's from neighbouring Councils be available, if required, to undertake any important or emergency work during a period of a colleagues leave (approximately 1-2 days per fortnight).

There were three dog attacks for the month, these have been investigated and owners spoken to. Owners of two dogs in Murtoa were issued fines. These dogs will continue to be monitored as they were declared as menacing dogs in another Council.

Another attack occurred in Brim (on sheep) all dogs have been euthanized by the vet with no further action required.

The third attack was on sheep in Warracknabeal; both dogs have been euthanized with costs being sorted between both parties with no further action required by Council.

Stephen Carlon (Relief Ranger) commenced door knocking for unregistered animals in random areas across the Shire. He also dealt with unsightly land issues and looked at cruelty issues with horses for the RSPCA in Warracknabeal.

Multiple cats have been surrendered across the Shire again this month, as well as unwanted stray cats (many of these have been euthanized).

This time of year we send out surveys to our clients with our Home and Community Care staff. Results showed that our clients were more than happy with the services available.

We will be training HACC staff this month in 'foot care' so they can identify and eliminate any early problems for their clients.

The Shire completed 10 transports for the month of April; we have been currently averaging 10 to 12 transports for a little while now.

Between the months of March and April, the Shire has gained three new volunteer drivers. Two drivers are based in Beulah and the other in Warracknabeal

This training session was available to every volunteer across the Shire which was advertised via posters and local newspapers. It was fabulous to see and we have the support from all volunteers. Morning tea was held after the training session which was much appreciated. The second session was held at the Warracknabeal Shire Office, 1pm to 3pm. 12 Volunteers attended and finished the day with a supplied afternoon tea. All Volunteers appreciated the training session and thoroughly enjoyed it.

Surveys have been sent out to all Meals on Wheels & Transport Volunteers. They are coming back steadily; results will be compiled by mid May.

Country Football and Netball Program 2012/2013

The official 'Turning On of the Lights' for the Minyip Murtoa Football Netball Club oval at Murtoa Recreation Reserve was conducted by the Hon Hugh Delahunty MP on Tuesday, 29 April 2014.

Grant acquittal documentation will now be prepared to finalise the project.

Country Football and Netball Program 2014/2015

We are preparing applications for funding under both this round of the Country Football and Netball program and also to the Putting Locals First program for the Hopetoun Community Centre/Football Change Rooms upgrade. This project is to increase the available area and capacity of the community function room located at the facility.

It is proposed to request a grant of \$88,860 from the Country Football and Netball program and \$212,550 from Putting Locals First program. The total capital expenditure for the project is \$348,000 and the total project cost (which includes community in-kind) is \$416,700.

Community Facility Funding Program 2014/2015 – Minor Facilities

The activity schedule has been received, signed and returned for the Murtoa Bowling Club Synthetic Green project. It is anticipated works will commence late September/early October, weather permitting.

Community Facility Funding Program 2015/2016 – Minor Facilities

An Expression of Interest has been prepared and submitted for the installation of lighting to the new synthetic bowling surface at the Beulah Bowling and Croquet Club.

Should the Expression of Interest be supported a full application will then be developed.

Community Facility Funding Program 2015/2016 – Planning

An Expression of Interest has been prepared and submitted to develop a new Shire-wide Sport & Recreation Strategy, as the previous Strategy was prepared in 1997/98 and is obviously out of date.

Should the Expression of Interest be supported a full application will then be developed.

Hopetoun Fishery

Currently, we are waiting on a detailed plan from the Hopetoun Angling Club and GWMWater regarding fence re-location and proposed location of the cut in to the Lake prior to further investigations being undertaken. Once this information is received project costing can commence and possible funding sources investigated when the project cost has been determined.

Anzac Centenary Grants Program

We have developed an application under this program, in conjunction with the Warracknabeal RSL for remedial works to the commemorative main gates at Anzac Park. The application requests the full amount of almost \$15,300 capital expenditure.

11.3 Request to Rename part of Angle Road to 'Stronach Road' – Prepared by Nathan McLean

Due to the weather and some other factors; one family from Caroline Springs, a French-Canadian family from Richmond, a family from Templestowe, a family from Mentone and a lady from Tyabb were unable to attend. How-ever all will be contacted in the coming weeks to organize a private tour of Murtoa when it is more convenient for them.
